> Looking back at what God has done in and through DHF, and what He has done in and through Nancy and me, I marvel at the grace of God. I have met believers from coast to coast who have become part of the fabric of my life.

"There is a time for everything," including moving to Illinois and later to Texas where I currently reside. "There is a season for every activity under heaven," and for me the ministry of DHF has been "a season of refreshing . . . from the Lord" (Acts 3:19).

I can't tell you how excited I am about the next season for DHF. God continues to open doors for DHF to connect with churches and pastors. And we are partnering with the church plant team for The Stone Christian Church in Clarksville, TN the first church to be planted as a DHF church. Strengthening ... revitalizing ... planting churches. As Solomon later wrote, "God has made beautiful in its time" (Ecc. 3:11). Partnering with God, and celebrating with you, in this beautiful God-made season. Soli Deo Gloria!

What is the ministry of DHF?

Simply put, it is a commitment to being part of the answer to Jesus' prayer in John 17. DHF is dedicated to unifying the church around the truth of God's Word (John 17:17, 21-23). That is the basis of our mission statement: "It is the mission of Disciple Heritage Fellowship to encourage, strengthen, and lead Churches to fulfill Christ's mission."

But for what ultimate purpose?

When Wayne Kent became Executive Director in 2017, he asked a profound question: "We [DHF] fought for the authority of Scripture and for the salvation found in no other name under heaven than that of Jesus Christ. Well... what are we going to do with the theology we fought so hard to protect?"

First Christian Church of Carthage, IL has new life after deciding to withdraw from the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). The decision was made after a long and very prayerful process.

Pastor Jerome Lee attended the required DoC lay ministry program at Phillips Theological Seminary. The first day of his classes began with "the errancy of the Bible." Upon finishing the three-year program and showing the Elders what he was taught, FCC Carthage made the decision to stand firm on the authority of Scripture.

After much prayer and meeting with denominational representatives, it was apparent the belief in biblical truth and authority was absent from the DoC. The social gospel and social justice had replaced the Christ-centered Bible church that once was the DoC.

FCC Carthage was then referred to the Disciple Heritage Fellowship (DHF) to engage in conversation with other churches who had walked the same path and faced the same decisions. FCC Carthage found DHF to represent the

Bible-based church they are striving to be. The welcome and loving support for standing on the biblical truth that sin has consequences was foundational for us.

DHF offered the support a church like Carthage needs, while at the same time allowing the church to remain autonomous. FCC Carthage's choice to connect with DHF after more than 70 years as a DoC church was largely based on DHF's willingness to affirm the Bible as the inspired and authoritative Word of God. DHF is connecting Pastor Lee with other pastors weekly

to help strengthen his personal walk. They offer Elders forums and weekly encouragement. Their communication and willingness to help at every step in the process has been amazing.

FCC Carthage has grown from weekly attendance of 35-40 in 2020 to 65-70 in 2024. We attribute this growth to holding the Scriptures in highest regard and standing firm on the Gospel. The church invests in our community in many ways, from our youth group to a free — no strings attached — Clothing Closet. FCC Carthage is a loving and welcoming church choosing the truth of Scripture over the opinions of the world (social gospel). First Christian Church of Carthage is privileged to serve alongside and be a part of an organization that honors the Lord and the Word the way the DHF does.
